The neighborhood association will supply the food, as well as the plates and utensils, plus some entertainment. This very popular event has been evolving over the years and just keeps getting better. Come share in the fun and meet some new friends. If you are new to the neighborhood, the park is at the south end of Augusta Street.

Raffle

We'll have another wonderful raffle this year, featuring gift certificates from neighborhood restaurants including Evergreen Indian, Subway, and Track Town Pizza, as well as beautiful art work from our neighbors, coffee coupons, groceries, and other fabulous prizes. All proceeds go towards picnic expenses and for park improvements in the future, such as more benches and picnic tables.

Raffle tickets cost \$1 apiece, 6 for \$5, 13 for \$10, or 30 for \$20.

Dessert Contest

For the last few years the picnic has included a dessert contest, which has become very popular. All types of baked goods are eligible-cookies, as in bar, brownie, drop, molded, rolled, cut out, or refrigerator; cupcakes, pies, fruit crumbles and crisps or wherever your imagination and creativity leads you. Bring your delectable treats in a reusable container with your name and phone number hidden on the bottom. Bake enough for the judges to taste with some left over to share with the crowd. If the dessert you bring includes nuts, please include a label stating that. If you are one of the winners, we would love to have your recipe to publish in our newsletter.

Judging will be at 6:00 pm. Judges will include Alan Zelenka (our city councilor), as well as some of our neighbors. Along with fame, bragging rights and applause, prizes will be awarded for the judges' top 3 favorites!

Most everyone loves dessert and we'd be delighted to taste some of your favorites.

New Neighborhood Matching Grant Cycle Opens!

The City of Eugene Neighborhood Matching Grants cycle is now open and has \$50,000 available for neighborhood improvement and community-building projects. Projects may include, but are not limited to:


- Physical improvements that involve recreation or public safety facilities, natural resource features, public art and spaces or community gardens.
- Public school partnership projects that benefit school children and the immediate neighborhood.
- Neighborhood-based events and celebrations.
- Capacity-building initiatives that serve to create, diversify, or increase participation in a neighborhood-based organization or promote an understanding of issues important to neighborhood residents.

Grant guidelines and application materials are available on the City's web site, www.eugene-or.gov/matchinggrants, and at the Permit and Information Center, the Downtown, Bethel and Sheldon libraries, the Amazon, Hilyard, Sheldon, and Peterson Barn Community Centers and the Campbell Senior Center.

All applications will be required to undergo a pre-review by October 15, 2010, to ensure consistency with grant guidelines and existing plans and policies of the City and other partner agencies. Final applications are due on January 17, 2011. Awards will be announced in early April 2011.

I encourage everyone to consider what they would like for our neighborhood and whether this is a way to achieve that. One neighborhood painted their fire hydrants with individual designs and another did an oral history project which culminated in a neighborhood celebration. (Our neighborhood is certainly rich with history.)

One idea that surfaced at the recent Executive Committee meeting was some much needed maintenance and improvements to Laurel Hill Park. The Executive Committee is available to help you formulate a proposal, so put on your thinking caps and let's

As a group, we will ride bikes, carpool or enjoy a pedicab ride (donation requested) to 7 sites in the valley to sample a few of the ways that folks are practicing sustainability.

Learn about our local organic farm and its programs for youth, home photo-voltaic electricity generation, green home design and recycling of construction materials, conversion of lawn to food and native plant habitat, chicken keeping and greenhouse construction, bioswales and watershed protection, home canning and food preservation, and more.

All sites are in the valley bottom, short easy rides apart. Northwest Youth Corps has plenty of parking if you need to drive. (Plan to carpool from there or use NW Youth Corps's shuttle, as parking at tour sites is limited.)

Mobile Canning Project

This summer the community is invited to participate in a series of canning demonstrations in each of the six Eugene Community Gardens. Canning equipment will be hauled to each garden via our mobile bike cannery. With a double burner propane stove, portable sink, tables, buckets, and canning supplies loaded on our bike we're equipped to jam, pickle, and salsa out of doors with interested community members. Skinner City Farm will coordinate the demonstrations in collaboration with the Center for Appropriate Transport (CAT) with funding provided by a Neighborhood Matching Grant from the City.

The demonstrations will begin with raw ingredients and culminate with a finished can of preserves. Our canning focus is on what the typical home or community gardener will have in their garden patch. Our hope at Skinner City Farm is to teach and encourage folks to preserve summer harvests that would otherwise go to waste. We want to share how simple the canning process can be and at the same time build community within the gardens. Canning, we believe, will create an outlet for excess produce and increase local food security.

The Mobile Cannery is the beginning of a larger project at Skinner City Farm. Our long-term goal is to develop a Food Preservation Center where community members will be able to preserve foods in a large commercial kitchen.

The sun is out and our youth are outdoors! Over 900 young people are scattered across the Northwest building trails and restoring fragile ecosystems. This summer we here at NYC are working on more than just empowering youth through conservation, we are also making our facility more sustainable!

Our goal is reduce our carbon footprint and lower our utilities cost so that more resources can go to the youth. This summer we have literally raised our roof (to help with airflow and add natural light), replaced windows with more energy efficient designs, replaced our insulation, installed new environmentally friendly bathroom facilities that are ADA compliant, and added two solar-hot water systems to our facility.

Also, because of the fantastic support from community members such as our LHV neighbors, we won the EWEB Solar Array Grant and will be installing the new solar array THIS SUMMER!!!
